Growing Through Mentoring by Jennifer Mickle

Mentoring by definition is "to counsel or guide". For those of us in Pony Club, mentoring occurs at many levels. DC's mentor other parents to pick up the torch and carry on for them when the time comes. Parents mentor their children on becoming responsible members of society...Pony Club society in this case. Coaches mentor or guide us all in the fine points of riding technique. Stable management instructors mentor on horsemanship and horse theory. Older level Pony Club members mentor the younger or new members in "the Pony Club way". Why? We all have a love for horses and the craft of horsemanship. It is a goal to pass the legacy on and share our love of the magnificent creature called 'horse'!

However, this is not a skill that we are all born with and thus, must be developed. Scholars for many generations have studied and perfected teaching methods. It is these methods that continue to be shared and then further developed.

A teaching component is part of the testing at the A and B levels of Pony Club. It is far more productive to introduce mentoring concepts well before a candidate is studying at the A or B level. When the badge programme was introduced, a Mentoring badge was included. It is for these reasons that mentoring was introduced at Regional Camp in 2006. Our goal was to give our membership another opportunity to learn these skills.

But there is also another reason! Pony Club is a community within society. Pony Club exists because of the thousands of volunteers that provide their horse knowledge or organizational skills for every meeting or event. Part of being a Pony Club member means to give back to your organization! Each member will reach a level where they need to give of their time and knowledge to those following them through the ranks. It is an opportunity for personal growth! It is a skill that is worthy of being placed on your resume.

Regional Camp 2007 will again have mentoring as part of its programme. The Camp Committee learned a lot from our first "kick at the can" last year. Our first step this year is to better communicate what mentoring is all about to both members and camp instructors. This year, members of C level or above and of a minimum age of 14 (**see The National Education Handbook – Developing a Junior Instructor's Program**) will be required to participate in at least 3 mentoring sessions with the coaches on site. This is one of the ways that demonstrates that members are ready for the next level and appreciative of the efforts to bring out of province instructors like Carine Cudmore to Regional Camp.

As with all additions to PC activities, the Camp Committee is looking forward to developing the concept of mentoring in the camp environment. We encourage input from the membership that provides constructive development. Note: Forms and initial info will be distributed through your DC soon!

As a result, we cannot guarantee that all clinics will occur or that you will be able to attend every clinic you choose. The list below is the current clinic lineup:

Longeing (mandatory for C and up), Natural Horsemanship, Saddle fitting, Quadrille, Pacing, Le Trek, Chiropractor, Driving, Endurance, and Teeth.

There will also be a Social night for youth. The senior youth will be planning a separate event. The younger members will be having an entire camp event of their very own.

Reminder: Camp award (previously Darlene Craig Scholarship) will be once again given. Each camper is encouraged to write a story or draw a picture about our motto: Loyalty, Character, Sportsmanship. TETRATHALON NEWS by Sarah Read

Well here we are and spring is not just around the corner but here in full force, I have a Canada goose standing sentry on my slough and to a British import that my friends signifies spring and a return to civilization!

Lets break down the sport of Tet':

Modern Pentathlon came from the history books. Long ago in times before Canadian messengers had to deliver letters across country. As fighting with each other was the norm, much like you and your siblings, you would encounter any of the requirements of this sport. You would obviously be on a horse and jumping was compulsory just to get there. Sword fights were regular hence the fencing, later shooting with pistols might save you and the message. Swimming the rivers and lakes was common. Running just to find and steal a new horse was popular and could save your life. As times moved on sport was invented to entertain and keep skills sharp and now we have Modern Pentathlon, pent meaning 5. The Pony Club had adopted 4 of these for our Tetrathalon discipline:

RIDING

As a PC discipline firstly there is the equine content; show jumping and cross-country. For those of you involved in a comprehensive training schedule, such as participating in the Baldur fun show, 12TH May 2007 our silver anniversary (hint hint, plug plug) and Rally with a full one day event, this element is a 'no-brainer' as you have it covered.

Eventually there will be a need to ride a borrowed horse. So, try to swap with your friends as much as possible, suggest to your coach that you break your regular lesson down into segments and ride, assess and suggest helpful hints for each others animals. It's a really beneficial exercise for everyone and an ideal opportunity for you to all teach each other too. Not to mention it can be hysterical especially for me the coach looking on. Or teaching your coach can entertain; you should see me at 6' on the Dun Welsh at 12hh being taught by my son, no stirrups? Very funny Callum!

The loan horse will be well suited to you and there is ample opportunity to try it and speak with the owner prior to the competition and we are looking at a small height set of fences. Do not be lead astray with the rules for Modern Pentathlon where the horse name is drawn from a hat, the P.C. Tet' has been modified to be "kid friendly".

RUNNING

Well what is there to this, the distances are short medium races of 800 to 2000metres and these distances are offered at your school track meets. With the evenings getting longer its much easier to fit in a run just a couple of times a week, mum or dad can come too, they will thank you for it when they are fit and trim and ready for the summer show season where we I mean they run around like headless chickens after you very comfortably seated on leather padded, automatic 4 legged drive competitors wait patiently!!! For the one item you forgot...again! Callum has a flag half way down the drive and from the barn to it 3 times and back is 1000m and a couple of repetitions are the easiest way to get out of the washing up. Later in the year we increase a little and with modern day music systems it's not a bad way to firm those posteriors and be as fit as you expect your horse to be.

SHOOTING

This might be more challenging for you to set up but persevere. A lot of little towns have shooting ranges and your own garage works well but check with your parents for local regulations if you are in a built up area. You need 10 meters and a target 2.5m from the ground. I have spoken to the range captains in Brandon and we are welcome there with just a phone call at no charge. There is a range I know of in the city too and a gunsmith who can help at Selkirk. Portage has a facility as do Neepawa and Minnedosa. If you want me to make some arrangement for your club, come and get you started or make introductions just call or e-mail me. I was recently in Canadian Tire looking at pistols and a more than adequate gun, nice and light and easy to load was \$39.99 dollars, so, not a big investment. The targets there are very similar to PC ones [not the type I had at camp] and safety goggles are a must too. The pack with the hip holster is not a good idea. You will not be walking with your gun uncased and never carry it loaded, so, why do you want it under your arm like a Mexican Bandit? Do not shoot for too long as your arm gets tired, your accuracy will be off and frustration sets in. During competition 10 pellets is the maximum with a few warm-up shots. Walmart sells little dumb-bells and doing a few lifts and holds can really help the shooting arm and can be so easy during the 3-minute commercial break of your favourite TV show.

SWIMMING

Well here we have the bugbear for most of you. You really do need to find a swim club if you can, Brandon, Portage, Winnipeg and Selkirk I know have very good clubs and will welcome you to join and, if you explain your reasons will accommodate you. You can do minimal Butterfly for example but more stamina and endurance. Again the distances are basic, from 100 to 200 meters, that's 8 lengths of most pools. The Pan Am is 50m so just 4. If you are in the local pool program then level 6 gets you well on your way. Most small towns with a pool offer a lap session, private lessons for the older beginner and there is an excellent summer swim club program with meets too. I know Winkler, Hamiota, Neepawa, Dauphin and others are involved, call your local pool or check out the web for details. As an example we have been swimming with the Brandon Bluefins for 45minutes on a Monday all winter, Callum started at the red cross level 8 with recognizable strokes and happy in the water

but no idea of keeping going, turns, breathing etc. He now can do a healthy 200m averaging 30 seconds per lap and achieves well over 1000m in a training session. I do my groceries in Safeway as its not a spectator friendly time in 30 degrees above with eau de chlorine getting right to the back of the retina.

By far the biggest commitment to tetrathlon is the riding and we all have that covered. The rest can be a daunting prospect but really with a little time management and one night out a week to the pool, it is very attainable and the possibilities are endless. We are a great crowd sponsoring true sportsmanship and a good time is had by all. The experience can and will be a great positive educational one.

We are off to the Saskatchewan regional on the 9/10 June with our own horse. They are just a year or two ahead of us with dozen or so competitors, so why not come too?

I will be offering training sessions in my area this summer for everyone as I coach Callum and as always I am very happy to come to you. I competed up to and including national level modern Triathlon [no riding] in England coming in the first team and individual 3rd so, at this stage I can help you along. I am a qualified ASA [amateur swimming association] advanced teacher and competitive coach as well as British Horse Society instructor with many years experience in all of it and would love the opportunity to share with you all.
