Over the years, I have had the good fortune to meet Pony Club people from several countries around the world. I count these people as friends. Although I rarely see these Pony Club friends, it is easy to converse with them as we share the love of horses and a passion for Pony Club programs, which are universal. There are some geographic differences and Pony Club is more strongly rooted in some countries than others such as Great Britain and Ireland. This summer, I was able to witness first hand, how prominent Pony Club is in one such country - Ireland.

From August 20 - 24, I attended the World Small Animal Veterinary Congress, which was hosted this year in Dublin, Ireland, There were over 2800 veterinarians from around calling out the action as the the world in attendance.

The Congress was held at the Royal Dublin Society. This is a facility very similar to the Toronto Exhibition and Convention Centre where the **Royal Winter Fair and Horse** Show is held. Pony Club in Ireland is an integral part of the equestrian fabric of this nation. which itself has deep roots in the horse industry. What did this prestigious conference plan publicity of this magnitude is for its opening ceremonies? What could be a greater crowd pleaser than the Irish National Mounted Games Championships? As the veterinary delegates were civilly served wine and hors d'oeuvres while they watched the final set of six games plus a tie-breaker, they cheered on these young athletes who displayed the best gaming skills I have ever seen. The top six teams in Ireland were competing for the coveted Leonard Memorial Trophy.

Mounted games can foster audience participation at the best of times, so you can appreciate how this particular audience responded when you have a play-by-play announcer teams wind their way up and

down the field. It was like Bob Cole or Dick Irvin calling Hockey Night in Canada, but with mounted ponies and props substituted for skate-clad athletes chasing a puck around the ice. I consider myself fortunate to be involved with such a great international organization that promotes character, loyalty and sportsmanship in young equestrians around the world.

Moralee and Will Parke of England. While Jordan, Joe and I headed off early after the competition to our new host family, I heard rumors of Jean having a great birthday celebration with all the other international athletes.

hitch - a great wrap up for the competition. As our final night turned to day, we said our goodbyes and made off on a scenic trip to Shannon where we caught our flights home from an adventure of a life time.
