Disciplines

- Quiz: Penny McLaren: Quiz will be held on May 6th in Guelph. Venue is GCI in Guelph like last year. Guelph Pony club is doing lunch again \$5.00 - Grand River is handling the silent auction. Tack sale has been arranged. The opening will be deferred to 11:30am this year until everyone has a chance to see items. Clubs can rent the rooms with 10% proceeds to Region. Nationals will be held in Saskatoon in October.
- A/B/C Rally Lynn Morris: confirms 14 15 16th of July. Will be at Checkmate
- **PPG** Tom Radcliffe: We need to have to have D2s fast tracked. Perhaps D1 D2 National chair doing something with the A group, perhaps an event rather than the fun day or at the same time. This will be the transition year competitors have to be two years as A to qualify for nationals. The tentative date of June 10th is picked for the fun day. May have to change location from Aberfoyle to accommodate this. July 8th: Regional PPG. This year C Level riders- walk trot only, can have a spotter or leader aged 15 or older, safely attired with helmet and proper footwear. If you don't start with a helper then you don't get one. If the helper takes control of the horse you will now have to walk. If you canter you will be disqualified.
- **Dressage** Sue Eagleson: As a National Committee we decided to have a National Dressage Competition starting this year. To qualify for Nationals it will be the following divisions: Starter, Pretraining, Training and 1st level and above. It will be the highest score at the Regional Finals and only one in each division will qualify to go on to Nationals. So technically only the most kids each level will have is 13 to 15 kids. Qualifications will be discussed at the Dressage Workshop as the Regions decide on how this should work. Starter Division would be D1s and D2s - 12 years and older, Pretraining Division would be D1s to Cs - 12 years and older, Training Division would be D1 Level and above - 12 years and older. At these Nationals the rider will ride the 2 tests that they qualified on, but on strange horses. They will then ride a mystery test that will be called to them and finally they will write a written test also. They will be placed in teams and they will be billeted with families to help keep costs down. Also if any Regions have Pas de Deux Teams and Drill Teams they can be video taped and sent to Kasia and a committee will be set up to judge them and they can then be also National Champions.
- Show Jumping -Lani Harris there is a new rule book so we don't have to refer to EC. There may be a schooling show in Saturday June 17^{th.} COR wants to have zones this year -To be held August 12 in Oshawa. Also, looking at doing a national competition in 2007 with a 3 foot medal round one rider per class probably in Alberta. We could possibly use Zones this year to qualify for next year.

A Guide for DCs and possibly parents and volunteers too

Ralph Rainford's list of helpful hints for DCs from last year. They are as follows:

- 1. You are **not** queen/king. Be a leader, not a dictator.
- 2. Be an advocate in your branch, not just for your own kid.

- 15. Build an effective Executive for success.

Cross Country Schooling Etiquette

In Ontario, we're lucky that we have lots of Horse Trial competitions to choose from. Many of our event organizers kindly and generously allow people to school on their property between shows. In order to keep this privilege, event organizers have asked us to help educate our members, both competitors and coaches, on how to ensure that cross country schooling does not damage their properties or their courses, and to ensure that your schooling experience is safe. With the help of our organizers, we've compiled a simple list of Do's and Don'ts for Cross Country Schooling. If you are aware of and follow these guidelines, your schooling experience will be safer, your hosts will be happy to have you back, and our courses will last longer. We all win.

Dos and Don'ts For Cross Country Schooling

Do: Respect the land. If you want to enjoy good footing all season, this is the number one priority.

Do: School with a qualified, experienced coach.

Do: Pay up front and sign a waiver. Please don't make your host wait around until you are finished.

Do: Wear a helmet, proper footwear, and body protector.

Do: Confess if you've broken something or see something amiss.

Do: Take everything with you that came with you. Pick up your garbage and the manure from mucking out your trailer. Leave everything cleaner than when you arrived.

Do: Thank your host.

Don't: Attempt to jump fences above your current training and experience level. Be aware that the height of cross-country jumps is not necessarily an indicator of the appropriate level. Just because a fence is low does not mean that the "question" being asked is not at a higher level. **Don't**: Keep attempting a jump if you are having multiple refusals. You will ruin the footing. Please move on after 3 tries; either coming back to it later, or finding another jump with a similar question.

Don't: Allow your horse to paw in or at a water jump. This is the quickest way to destroy pond liners and create potholes. Don't allow your horse to stand about at a water jump. This encourages pawing; and besides, you want your horse to go forward through water!

Don't: Tolerate abuse, either of the horse or the rider. This one goes without saying, but our organizers want to reinforce this point. They stress that this goes for any abusive behavior in the parking lot as well as on course.

That's it! Be gracious, be safe, be respectful. Thanks for doing your part in making sure we all have places to school and compete in the years to come.

Article from a pony club member about her first D Rally! By Caitlyn Parisi, Age 15, Hamilton, Ontario, (Niagara PONY CLUB)

From Therapeutic riding to Show Jumping, Jem can do it all!

I remember when I first noticed Jem out in the pasture at Shady Maple Stables in Smithville. As soon I saw the grey Arabian pony I could not take my eyes off of him. I had never noticed him before so I then asked around about him. I found out that he was one of the horses used in the H.A.T.S (Horse Alternative Therapeutic Services program), a non-profit charitable organization dedicated to the belief that the unique bond between horses and humans enhances the physical and emotional well being of riders who have disabilities. Coincidentally this was around the same time I was going to start volunteering for them.

Supreme Jem , one of H.A.T.S horses, is a 9 year old purebred Arabian sired by Csardas Jemil, out of Supreme Lace, bred by Neil and Janice Anderson and donated to H.A.T.S by the McLachlan family.

When I first started volunteering with H.A.T.S. I noticed that Jem spooked at everything, including his own shadow. I started exercising Jem, and was shocked at how often he spooked and how afraid he was of everything. I came off on several occasions, so spent a lot of time slowly introducing Jem to new things around the arena. I also noticed that his hip/stifle would lock frequently and then found out it was due to a stifle problem.

I am also a member of the Canadian Pony Club (Niagara branch) which is a volunteer-run, nonprofit national organization across Canada for young people who want to learn more about horses, riding and stable management. I have been a member of the Niagara Pony Club since 2003 and have enjoyed participating in activities at the branch, regional and zone levels. This year all of the major events were in our region and I needed a horse so that I could participate. The most fun event in Pony Club is called the Prince Phillip Games (PPG) and you need a pony to participate in this event. I decided to start working with Jem on a regular basis to see if I could prepare him for not only this fun event but also for another Pony Club event called Regional Dressage and Show Jumping.

In May 2005 I started riding Jem in my two lessons during the week with my coach Renate McGillvray at Shady Maple Stables. Once he was ridden regularly, Jem spooked less and seemed a much happier pony. We began giving him MSM and his stifle no longer locked up. We started jumping, developing frame and gaining trust from each other. I started to part-board Jem from H.A.T.S so that I could ride and show him.

June 4, I took Jem to PPG fun day held in Aberfoyle. This day was going to be the true test and would tell me if I had a pony for show season. PPG fun day went wonderfully and I was so proud of Jem and also of myself for getting him there. Jem enjoyed playing the games and didn't spook at any of the props. I was then looking forward to the whole show season with Jem. From that day on my entire focus was working with Jem so that we could participate in both the Pony Club's Regional Dressage and Show jumping event which was to be held on July 30, 2005 at Glenarden Farms in Fergus.

My coach Renate and I decided that on top of regular lessons we would need to take Jem to various schooling shows to prepare Jem for these Pony Club events. Renate and I worked very hard at training Jem. I admit there were moments of pure frustration and times I wanted to give up. It always seemed that we would take two steps forward and three steps back. Renate taught me how to teach Jem. We worked as a team; Renate, Jem and I. I found out just how much work, effort and time is needed to train a pony. Although it was a lot of hard work, it has

also been a very rewarding experience. Jem's name is very fitting because he really is a "gem". He has a lovely disposition and is eager to please and overcome his fears for me. I wouldn't take any horse over Jem. He is a very unique pony and the relationship we have is very comforting. He follows me around like a dog and will also shake a tongue. To me he seems like my little brother. It is truly hard to explain the bond. But this whole experience has shown me that animals and humans can have the same sort of bond as people have daily.

During the summer months we attended several schooling shows and the Hunter Pace at the Hamilton Hunt Club placing fourth in the jumper group. Along the way we earned some ribbons but more importantly we made noticeable progression; the ribbons just added to my happiness. As long as I coaxed Jem over the first round of jumps, there were no more problems. Jem soon gained enough trust in me and didn't think the jumps were going to eat him anymore and he stopped looking at them in time. Jem and I were developing a partnership and we were having a good time in the show ring.

Regional PPG was held on July 9/05 at Fergus Community Centre. We played on a Masters Team and Jem had a great time playing the games. He didn't mind the balloon popping but definitely didn't like the fishing game. Our team placed 1st in the Masters Division.

I also had the opportunity to take Jem to my dressage coach, Elaine Ward-Turcotte, to use her 20 X 60 dressage ring. I needed to expose him to the dressage ring prior to attending the Pony Club Regional Dressage Show. We were going to do First Level Tests 1&2 and needed some practice in the bigger dressage ring. I began to question if we could perform at this level in a show but decided we were up for the challenge.

July 30/05 was a perfect day for a horse show. It was a nice sunny day and not too hot - a rarity this summer. We were successful in completing our first level tests and Jem had an amazing stretchy circle in both tests. We placed 3rd overall and I was very pleased with our performance. In show jumping we participated in the Entry Level Division 2'3" with a 2'6" jump off. We placed 4th overall and just qualified to participate in the Central Zone Show jumping and Dressage Championships which were to be held at Blacks Equine Centre on August 20-21, 2005. I was thrilled. This event brings riders from 3 regions; Western Ontario, Central Ontario and St.Lawerence Ottawa Valley to compete against each other.

The previous two years I had also qualified for Central Zone Championships. The first year it was held at York Equestrian Centre and I went for the dressage and won the event. It was a great experience. Last year I also qualified for the Show jumping championships and I was so excited because I knew we could win. Unfortunately it was held in the Kingston area and we couldn't afford the trailering costs. It was a disappointment but we took champion at D Rally, another amazing pony club event.

Qualifying for Central Zone Show jumping and Dressage Championships meant another 3 weeks of hard work but I was up for it. During these 3 weeks I started experiencing problems with Jem. He seemed to have more energy and he would just race around the ring like he was running away from me and playing games. My coach had always said "acting up before a show is a good sign, it will give you a better performance" and "Rome wasn't built in a day". Once again, she was right. We had our dressage tests on the Saturday and Jem performed beautifully. We came in 3rd overall again but to me we were the class champions. Those were our best dressage tests and I was so happy with Jem. Jem received so many compliments that day as well. After ribbons were handed out, I settled Jem in his stall; gave him water, hay and lots of carrots for his stay away from home.

Bright and early the next day I saw him, with only one dirty spot on him. That was a shock to me. So I got Jem ready and I got myself ready. I was pumped for this event. Jem was all decked out, in the jumper attire as we walked up to the turnout judge. We had a great warm up and Renate was there helping and supporting. Now it was time for the course walk. I had the course memorized and knew that I would have to chase Jem over the first 3 fences as that is where he normally hesitates7. My heart was racing as I entered and once I heard the whistle after the salute the adrenaline started pumping. Although it probably wasn't a pretty round we got over every fence with no refusals, just one rail down. This meant we didn't make it to the jump off. It was no big deal for me as I was happy we got over all those scary jumps. We got a third in that round. The second round, we made it to the jump off and got great corners and quick shortcuts and pinned a 1st in that round. The third round was an equitation medal class. I can honestly say that, that round was the best ride I've ever had on Jem. We seemed so perfect and got a lot of compliments. It felt really good. We got a 1st in that round. This made us the Entry Level 2'3" with a 2'6" jump off champions! Plus we got 1st in turnout out of the first three divisions!

When I first started riding Jem, I did not expect any of this to happen. The feeling that day was so overwhelming and I felt I had achieved such an accomplishment with Jem, I was so proud of myself and of my new pony. Jem and I have moved up a notch on the ladder and are doing newer and harder things. This experience hasn't just found me a pony to ride and train, it has found me a friend. A friend that will never bring me pain and will always be there to comfort me. Whether its when I'm laying down with him in his stall, galloping around the field or joining up in the round pen, Jem and I have created a bond that will never break. Jem is not just a riding pony to me, he is a friend, a true companion.

I would like to thank H.A.T.S. for giving me this opportunity, for I would trade it for none other. It has taught me many things and one thing is for sure; everyone needs a Jem in their life.
