2.2 Rally

Report submitted by Jacqui Dennis, National Rally Chair

Regional Rallies across Canada consisted of competitive 1 day, 2 day, working rallies and Fun Days.

Nova Scotia held their rally in conjunction with Central Nova Horse Trials on July 13/14. 3 teams with 17 participants. The rally does cost the region money, but they feel it is well spent and encourages participation. They are hoping to increase numbers. Nova Scotia sent a full team to National Rally.

Western Ontario Region held a 1-day Rally for D & C's at the Caledon Hunt Club. They had 37 riders from a Special D Level field up to Training Level. Stable Management consists of Turnout, Cool out and general horsemanship throughout the day. 2 riders were sent to National Rally.

Central Ontario Region – Held a Fun Rally day for schooling and 2 working Rallies – Spring & Fall at Saddlewood. Fun & Learning times. COR sent 1 groom & 1 non-riding Captain to National Rally and are especially proud of Emily Lindsay for being chosen for the Inter Pacific Exchange (She also attended National as non-riding Captain even though COR had no riders).

Saskatchewan – Held a working rally May 24-26. Had 18 participants including 3 grooms, 1 non-riding Captain and 3 Horsemasters, 4 branches participated. Unable to send a team to National but hoping to next year.

National Rally - SLOV hosted National Rally. In the week before Rally was held the Region discovered that the organizer had misunderstood some things. Brenda Salmon & Cat Hunter took over and completely reorganized Rally 12 days prior including a whole new venue- Forever Green Stables in Glen Robertson and contracting horse rentals, judges, etc. With such short notice they did an awesome job. The horses from Forever green were all Off The Track Thoroughbreds and all evented and were of excellent quality. Fees were \$425 per rider and \$225 per groom/captain/chaperone. Rally had 12 riders and 10 Captain/Grooms.

Inter Pacific Exchange – A team of 4 riders, a Coach and a Team Manager were sent to Hong Kong for the IPE from June 30 to July 10. The unrest in Hong Kong was not prominent at this time and a good time was had by all. Canada came 4th out of 5 teams but represented Canada wonderfully. Both the coach & Manager were impressed with their sportsmanship and cohesiveness as a team. I am excited



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to report that there were 7 riders, 3 coaches & 4 Team Managers apply. I organized 3 Regional Rally Reps to be on each selection committee (based on the fact that they did not have anyone from their region apply for the position they were deciding on). Alberta had numerous riders apply and 3 were chosen. Coreena Koschewski, Teagan Williams & Carlie Wells. Emily Lindsay from COR rounded out the riders. Lana McGrotty from WOR was selected as Team Manager, the Coach was Lezah Williamson from BC who arranged a 3 day camp prior to heading off to Hong Kong. A bonus was that Lezah volunteered the team (with their consent) to help with National Tet being held on June 26. In exchange the team was able to ride a lot of the horses used giving the coach a chance to work with the team and the team able to ride different types of unknown horses. Both Lana and Lezah were well organized and did an awesome job.

2.3 Tetrathlon

3.1 Alberta South Region

Within the Alberta South Region we have 13 Branches and one Riding Centre. In 2019 we had a total of 198 active members and 26 Horse Masters.

Some of our branches have the luxury of an indoor arena, which allows them to ride throughout the winter as well, but for most branches the year starts off with stable management lessons.

Mid-March the Region organized a two-day Education weekend. Several topics were addressed during the weekend, both focussing on horse and rider fitness. Topics ranged from Sport Psychology and Tai Chi for the rider to an in-depth look at the horse's mouth, bitting, conditioning and lesson planning.

As part of our Education series a separate Equine First aid clinic was hosted on February 24th, which was very well attended with 31 members.

- → To ward off the winter blues, we hosted another weekend-long education conference and attendees were kept busy with informative guest speakers, fun activities, and yummy meals against the backdrop of a well-appointed local hotel. We were very pleased to welcome CPC Administrator Val Crowe who brought insightful responses to questions from volunteers and members.
- → The always popular Working Rally weekend-long camp had two successful installments spring and fall where participants bunked on-site with their horses for mounted lessons, stable management sessions, and camaraderie.
- → Regional competitions included Quiz, our series-of-three PPG meets, and two qualifiers each with combined finals in Dressage and Show Jumping. We are doing our best to rejuvenate what was once a popular LeTrec event and appreciate the invitation of neighbouring WOR for Tetrathlon and Rally competition.
- → COR was well-represented at higher-level competition:
 - o COR had a member travel to Hong Kong with the Canadian Inter Pacific Exchange team
 - COR had one member on Team Canada at the USPC-hosted International Mounted Games Exchange in Colorado
 - o National Tetrathlon in BLCM saw each of junior and senior girl entries
 - o A Groom and Captain attended National Rally in SLOV
 - We had delegates in C, A/B and HM levels at National Quiz in SK
- → The growth of Horsemasters in COR has been interesting, including one branch made up exclusively of HM.
- → Testing numbers fell considerably in 2019 over 2018 statistics. COR did remove mandatory testing for participation in mounted events, which together with reduced membership numbers would have played a role in this.



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→ COR members continue to do their best to promote Pony Club, whether through displays at fairs, community fundraisers or walking in local holiday parades. Our online presence (website, private Facebook group, public Instagram) continues to be looked at for ways to engage existing members and attract potential new members and families.

The fall Annual General Meeting brought a few new faces to the regional committee table, and also saw a transition between roles for several existing regional and branch volunteers. The committee looks forward to working collaboratively in 2020, to provide the excellent opportunities that we all know benefit our members and their families.

Our 7th annual regional camp was a success with several branches participating. Our volunteers worked diligently to support the youth in their activities. We had an increase in members participating at a national level and there appears to be more awareness among our members regarding national events with a desire to set this as their goal.

We had a very busy season and hosting regional and national events and look forward to 2020.

Our discipline chairs and committee chairs have provided annual reports that are included below.



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Report submitted by Alisa Cue, NS National Director

It has been a very busy time on the National Board with lots of changes on the horizon. The board is a very dedicated group of individuals who continue to work diligently behind the scenes to work for the good of the organization and our members. We understand that change is hard, and we appreciate everyone's patience as we work through this transition period as an organization. We continue to evolve so that Canadian Pony Club remains current and meets best practices within our industry which will ensure that CPC has a bright future. We had numerous items discussed at the SAM in Toronto and below is a summary of our discussions.

Insurance-As mentioned in documents already circulated to the Region. Coaches that are being
paid are not covered under CPC Insurance. This includes Stable Management, Riding, Clinic etc.
Coaches that are volunteering are still covered as are examiners and officials. It is important
that branches ask for proof of insurance for anyone that is being paid to coach pony club
lessons. Honorariums, gift cards, free lessons in exchange for teaching are all examples of
things that would still be considered payment.



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- Our National Chair Jane Goodliffe is currently in China working with the Chinese Pony Club.
 Pony Club in China is really taking off and they are looking to work with Canadian Pony Club and participate in some exchanges. They invited Jane to spend two weeks in China and to explore how the two countries could work together moving forward
- All Charter Renewals are now due please make sure you are getting them into Val so she can send them on to the National Chair.
- Our supplies have now moved to Alberta and our Shopify store is up and running on the new website. You can order all your badges, medical armbands, pins, CPC socks etc through the site. The new CPC socks are now available and would make a great Christmas gift.
- There has been money put in the budget to build out the membership database to make it easier to use and to help CPC capture more information about our members
- It was encouraged that regions hosting an examiners workshop offer practical hands on training to examiners in a ring with riders instead of only talking about paperwork
- For those Regions that have centres they are now allowed to have two representatives attend the Regional Board meeting. The center administrator and an adult to represent the members.
- Out of the 9 regions that sent in paperwork for a testing grant only one sent in a final report. If you do not send in a final report Gwen will not release the funds. She is allowing Regions to Dec 15 to get in their final reports if they missed the deadline.
- There will be new flat tests for testing starting in Spring 2020
- Regions need to update their examiners lists and notify Gwen if you are planning on having any B or B2 tests. She would like test dates for upper level tests early so that examiners in training can plan to attend to shadow.
- The youth brought forward that they would like examiners to have sensitivity training so Gwen
 is going to look into this with her testing committee as well as education around changing the
 distances for ponies at testing.
- National competitions will run as usual in 2020. In 2021 CPC will adopt an alternating rotation
 for National Competitions with the exclusion of Quiz and IMGE Selection Camp. We will re visit
 this decision at SAM 2022. The reason for this decision was that the same Regions continue to
 host National events and that it is leading to volunteer burnout.
- Show Jumping and Quiz are already confirmed to be hosted in ANR in 2020. IMGE Selection Camp will be hosted in NS and Dressage in Alberta South.



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- National made a decision to black out the last two weeks of June so that Regions cannot hold a
 national even during that timeframe. This will allow high school students to finish exams and
 attend prom and graduation
- All Regions are being required to update their R and R's for the April meeting. The updated R and R's are due into the National office no later them March 1st
- Regions are encouraged to find an active youth rep to sit on the Regional board and to
 encourage branches to appoint a Youth Rep. It would be nice if Regions could facilitate the
 entire branch youth reps coming to a meeting so they could discuss youth issues.
- If a CPC Center chooses to host a Regional event, then they need to make sure that all the funds are run through the Regional Bank account not the center bank account
- Western D and D1 workbooks are now available and the D2 workbook will be available in Spring 2020. Test sheets are done all the way up to D2 so branches with Western members can encourage them to test.
- Branches are strongly encouraged to make sure they are putting together a budget for the year for their branch
- Branches and Regions are encouraged to have three signing authorities on bank accounts
- Branches and Regions are allowed to have GIC's but are not allowed to invest in high risk portfolios

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SUMMER CAMP

We had 21 members attend camp this July at the Annapolis Valley Exhibition grounds in Lawrencetown. We had three instructors (Julia Foote-Young, Jill Barker, and Alex Beaton) over the three days allowing members to have 5 lessons in total over the 3 days. We took members swimming at the pool in town, members made a string art craft, and participated in two guest lecture sessions (Vet – Dr. Nicole MacHattie, and Saddle Fitter – Callan Saddlery). Members stayed on the grounds in the arts and crafts building using air mattresses and cots, and meals were provided in the dining hall. I have heard back from a few of the competitors and regions and it has all been positive and the competitors had a great time.

3.4 Saint Lawrence and Ottawa Valley Region

As was the case last year, events in the region were driven by the younger ages of the majority of our members, and the fact that most do not own or have regular access to a horse or pony. We have had considerable changes to membership in the region in the last few years, with branches folding and restarting. We did have a slight boost in membership this year, compared with last year, including a handful of additional Horsemasters, which is promising; although there continue to be challenges retaining members for multiple years. It would likely be beneficial to target efforts at retaining existing members where possible, as we seem to be able to recruit members but retaining them is a bigger issue.

We have had a few restarted branches this year: Land O' Lakes, Village Creek PC, and United Counties PC. Kingston and Region has restarted after a brief hiatus and some shifts in facility and executive. We hope to have Renfrew County PC starting up again shortly after a short break and a few years in limbo.

WINTER CAMP AND QUIZ

Both well run and well attended events, as usual (Winter Camp by Allison Moore; Quiz by Diana Bayer and Brenda Salmon). These are two of our most popular events, as we have a large demographic of younger members who do not own ponies which makes unmounted activities popular.

<u>PPG</u>

We had a successful regional PPG Championship this year, building on last year's event with Allie Vieweg again as PPG Chair. The Regional Champs were hosted at the Merrickville Fair, and were well attended (close to 30 riders); however, it should be noted that a large proportion of participants were either PC alumni, or members of a local USPC branch who were invited to attend. It was great to see participation from these groups, although it would have been nice to have had higher attendance from our own members. We were fortunate to have Allie, former World Championship mounted games



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competitor, offer some PPG clinics (3) earlier in the year. Allie also attended the International Mounted Games Exchange in Colorado as coach of Team Canada, and represented SLOV well. SLOV is in a building phase with PPG after a few years of reduced interest, and we are very fortunate to have Allie's experience and enthusiasm. More exciting things are expected to come for PPG next year, as the Regional Champs will be hosted at the South Mountain Fair. The timing of Merrickville has conflicted with activities of several of our branches, preventing some members from attending. This will hopefully be remedied by the coordination with the South Mountain Fair, on a different weekend. We were also fortunate to have some ponies loaned for the event by Diana Bayer to riders who did not own their own mounts, without which the event would have had lower attendance from current members.

RALLY

This year's rally was planned as a "bootcamp" for more advanced members, with many interesting higher-level clinics and activities planned by Allison Moore. Unfortunately, the event did not garner sufficient interest and ultimately had to be cancelled. The same outcome occurred for an "adult camp" that Cat had planned in the fall for more advanced members. These cancellations were disappointing, and largely reflect the demographics of our current membership, with a limited number of advanced/senior members.

Thanks to the initiative of our education co-chair, Pam Nunn, a lower level rally was organized on relative short notice, following the cancellation of the boot camp rally. Attendance at this event also could have been higher, which was disappointing considering the intention in scheduling this event was to address the needs of the younger member demographic.

EDUCATION

A successful education day was hosted in April with a variety of clinicians/topics. Several in-house clinics were hosted by various branches (e.g., a shooting clinic as prep for Tetrathlon, and a polo clinic held at Heroncrest Stables). An examiner's clinic was held in July which was graciously hosted by Christine Allard of Forever Green Stables who offered her facility and horses for free; this was held in the east end because it seemed that there was considerable interest from potential examiners in that area. Unfortunately, it was ultimately not that well attended (5 participants), although those who attended found it very beneficial. We will need to coordinate an examiner testing session next year as most of the examiners on the list are due or overdue for an updated clinic participation in order to remain on the list.

NATIONAL RALLY

SLOV hosted National Rally this year. Despite some significant organizational challenges, including a last minute venue change due to a miscommunication about the cost of the original venue, the planning team (Cat Hunter, Brenda Salmon, Allison Moore) managed to pull together a solid event with contributions from many of our board members and alumni, which received mostly positive feedback.



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This was thanks, in large part, to Christine Allard of Lake of Two Mountains Hunt PC, who provided not only the facility, but most of the horses and camping areas for the participants – without this generosity, the event would have been very difficult to run.

SHOW JUMPING/DRESSAGE

The Regional Championships for both Show Jumping and Dressage were held conjointly again this year, and this will likely be the approach for these two activities for the foreseeable future. A small number of members attended, but most participated in a number of classes, in both the jumping and dressage, and the event received positive feedback from participants. The event was hosted at a nice facility (Oxford Ridge Stable in Oxford Mills, ON) but there were some issues with the facility management and the plan for next year is to host this event at a different facility.

TETRATHLON

A last-minute change of facility (due to potential teacher strike at the school location where Regional Tet had been booked for months) produced some unexpected challenges in the execution of the event. In addition, Regional Tetrathlon was extremely well attended – unexpectedly so, with three times the number of participants as attended last year (approximately 30). The event was fairly well run, all things considered, largely thanks to the experience of our Tetrathlon Chair, Karl McCague, with some suggested feedback for improvement for next year. The high attendance at this event is a very positive direction for the region.

TESTING

Several branches hosted testing at the branch level although fewer members tested at the branch level than in recent years, and recruiting and certification of Examiners is an issue. Regional testing was successfully run for the few members at this level. The experienced Test Chair duo of Katiana Fleck and Anne Marie Duarte organized a positive testing experience, yet again. Testing is one of our most expensive activities and is largely subsidized by the Region. This year, costs were down compared to last year, resulting in the region spending less on this discipline.

FUNDRAISING AND MARKETING

Susan Lorden has continued her ongoing efforts to promote PC whenever possible, at local events, and we have had other members promote Pony Club at other activities (like Sabrina and Acacia Gifford at Lansdowne "Horse Day"). In general, though, we did not have much of a Fundraising or Marketing initiative this year. There were a few activities suggested that did not come to pass. We managed cover the costs of National Rally, but will need some more concerted fundraising efforts going forward, especially in advance of hosting future National events. There is a potential position being created on the board to secure Sponsorship funding, which would be a real boon for the region.



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3.5 Western Ontario Region

Membership was at 214 in 14 branches + 1 riding Centre. We also had 8 horse masters in our region. So total membership of 222.

3.5.3 NATIONAL EVENTS

3.5.4 REGIONAL SUMMARY

Regional meetings were held monthly throughout the year. Meetings for January through to April were held in conjunction with Discipline Workshops. Senior Education sessions ran in conjunction with the meetings as well. We were very active in testing our members as well.

Our Annual General Meeting was held November 23rd at the County of Wellington Museum & Archives, Fergus, Ontario. In conjunction with the meeting (Branch and Discipline Review topics), we held education sessions for the youth. We then met for a combined lunch and in the afternoon had the National and International competitor presentations while the youth were present. Guelph Pony Club again won the High Point Trophy for the 11th year in a row with Windsor-Essex coming in 2nd place which is a huge accomplishment (considering they are only 3 years old).



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Many thanks to all of our dedicated and hardworking volunteers who stepped up to fill roles to ensure our members continued to have access to all discipline events.

4 MISCELLANEOUS REPORTS

4.1 Equine Canada

Report submitted by Kim Leffley, EC representative

Things have been pretty much status quo with our relationship with EC. They have been very busy with their Canadian Equestrian Development project which saw the hiring of a couple of consultants to help restructure their Coaching and Learn to Ride programming. The talks CPC representatives attended in January this year with the consultants, proposing a potential CPC partnership in this effort, seemed to be one of two final contacts we had with them until just recently.

As of the writing of this report, we are working with Tracey McCague-McElrea (Executive Director of Ontario Equestrain and co-consultant on the CED project) to try and arrange a meeting with Yves Hamelin, the new Interim CEO of EC. This came as a result of our final of multiple outreaches to them after 8 months of silence on their side. The explanation for that silence was "we were busy rolling out the new Coach Licensing program and dealing with staff changes".

As you are aware, EC has again gone through a series of high-level leadership changes which are being attributed to the restructuring they are undergoing to align with their Strategic Plan Initiatives. This appears to have again shaken the confidence of the grassroots participants. It is becoming evident that changes they are making to their coaching requirements and other structures will have a direct impact on our organization.

We responded to a request for questions to be addressed at their AGM and sent one asking their intentions regarding creating a voting category for orgs such as ours (and 4H, Cantra etc) who represent a strong number of grassroots equestrians but really don't fit or have a voice in their current governance structure. It was supposed to have been addressed at the AGM but was not. We received an apology from EC President Meg Kreuger with a timeline on when it would be addressed by the Board (at Convention meetings).

We opted not to send a representative to ECs Convention this year as the benefits from the networking and educational sessions offered (almost all High Performance focused and led) did not seem to merit the expense.

4.2 Membership

For 2019, we ended the year with 1894 Active Members and 219 Horsemasters for a total of 2113 members. That is up 49 members from 2018.




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

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

This was the 3rd year we had National Pony Club Day!

Active Members, Horsemaster, alumni and volunteers were all encouraged to participate. We offered a contest for participating in national pony club day which **included** posting a photo with your favourite CPC memory and using the hashtag #nationalponyclubday.

Many members posted photos on Facebook or Instagram, others reshared past Facebook posts, **other** comments photos on our posts, and many used the Facebook frames.

Regional Youth Meetings

We hosted two youth meetings at National Quiz again this year; one for youth reps and one for all members in attendance.



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For the youth rep meeting, we had Regional Youth Reps from MB, SLOV, BCIN, ANR (Alison), WOR & NS (Rebecca) attended. This year we had a small discussion about the positives and negatives the regional youth reps are facing within their region, as well I asked the members attending and emailed youth reps who did not attend a survey to fill out.

The survey summary can be found below and reflects the discussion we had in the regional youth rep meeting. Please note only 7 out of the 13 regions responded: WOR, SLOV, Manitoba, ABS, Saskatchewan, ABC, ANR.

The majority of current regional youth reps do not want to be regional youth reps next year for various reasons including:

- Postsecondary
- ageing out before the term is over
- held the position long enough, would like someone new to have the opportunity
- Do want to hold the position any longer
- Did not enjoy the position due to the expectations for the position are too high for a member.

Everything seemed like a fight like getting branch youth reps to participate. This position is pretty much unnecessary because no one (the regional board) listens anyways. They just do what they want to do.

Which leads into the issues of no one wanting to be a potential National youth rep for various reasons including:

- The time commitment was the largest reason
- Do not have the desire to
- Frustration with National CPC, if National isn't willing to listen to other adults on how to make pony club better and safer (insurance wise) then how can I expect them to listen to me?
 Canadian pony club is really far behind other countries and I'm not sure how to make National realize it and help fix it.

Overall Takeaways from the Regional Youth Rep Survey:

Many youth reps are having communication issues with their branches and/or regional board. Many youth reps feel like the youth should have a stronger voice as they are becoming discouraged and to them, it just seems parents and the adults do what they want not specifically what the members want

Regional Youth Reps are wanting a platform to connect with other youth reps across the country

Lack of interest for youth rep positions: Most regions are just putting someone in the position whether they are motivated to be a youth rep or not and it is very difficult to get a hold of them and their impact in the region is minimal to none



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Our Suggestions:

- We would like our Youth Rep Brochure and Active member application posted on the CPC website in the "Our Youth Directors", so it's more viable to members browsing the website. As well as developing some of the content on that page.
- Creation of a Branch and Regional Youth Rep badge
- Creation of a Branch and Regional Youth Rep Handbook with duties, suggestions, how to reach out to for help etc.

Youth Meetings

For the annual youth meeting, we assembled a PowerPoint which informed members on upcoming news like the CPC Excellence Award, Active Member applications, CPC store and national pony club day. This year is we presented the members with a list of questions again to get their answers and feedback on. Lots of quiz participants were able to answers these questions right away during the meeting or place their responses along with any other feedback and/or concerns in our virtual suggestion box. Having a suggestion box at the national quiz has been a great way for members to express their concerns, comments, suggestions and ideas anonymously. - it's a little suspicious when EVERY SINGLE first place is to the home team. It can't be "home town advantage" at the point.
- Better horses for national events and better-quality national events
