

2 NATIONAL NEWS

2024 was a special year for the Canadian Pony Club, as we were proud to celebrate our 90th anniversary.

This was a great time to reflect on some of the history of our organization.



Pony Club started in the UK in 1929 and the first Canadian Branch, the Eglington Hunt Club in Toronto, was founded in 1934. Colonel Timmis and Brigadier McKee decided to bring the idea of Pony Club to Canada from the UK. Colonel Timmis became the DC of the first branch in Canada – the Eglinton branch in Ontario. Over 200 children became a member with this branch at a fee of 75 cents.

The Pony Club movement spread across Canada from the Maritimes to BC. Many branches came and went. In 2010, after its 75th anniversary the Eglinton Branch was unfortunately disbanded. At the moment Saskatoon is our oldest branch still in existence (1946), followed by Toronto and North York (1949).

The first ever member to achieve an A level in Canada was Mrs. Adele Rockwell in 1935. She kept Pony Club in Canada alive during the hard years of WWII; She was the DC to the Eglinton Branch from 1939 to 1949. Adele is an Honorary Life Member of the Canadian Pony Club in recognition of her accomplishments and many years of service to the organization.

In 1972 'the Canadian Pony Club' became incorporated as a Charitable Amateur Athletic Association. The objectives of the corporation were to educate those *under 21 years* of age in the art of horsemanship.

It was hard for members to achieve an A level before they turned 21, and in 2003 Affiliate members were introduced, to allow those that were between 21 and 25 years old to finish their testing. In 2008

the CPC introduced a SM stream for those that would like to pursue the non-riding levels through Pony Club. This was in 2010 followed by the introduction of Flat & Jumping streams, to accommodate those that might not have a suitable horse for upper-level jumping.

In 2010 the CPC introduced the concept of Centres. Those that don't own a horse or pony can ride at a barn that is allowed to administer the pony club program to its members.

In 2014 the objectives were officially changed to state 'under 25 years of age' and members could stay Active Members until they turned 25. In 2015 CPC added the Horsemaster category, so there is no more upper age limit to becoming a Pony Club member.

Safety has always been an important consideration in Pony Club. The use of helmet (or hard hats) has always been strongly encouraged through Pony Club. In 1991 the use of <u>certified</u> helmets became mandatory for all CPC events.

The use of safety vests on cross country was introduced in the 2001 Rally Rules. At that time, it was only a recommendation. In 2009 Safety vests became mandatory for XC. Since 2023 the CPC has adopted safe sport policies to create positive and ethical sporting environments for all our members.

2.1 Governance changes

The Canadian Pony Club has adopted new bylaws that changes the way the organization is managed.

Most prominent is the change from a representative board (composed of representatives from each region) to a skills-based board of directors.

With this move to a skills-based board, directors can be sought out to have a background in a particular professional field such as finance, marketing, law or insurance.

The new structure also brings a clear distinction between the members of the organization - in this case the regions, and its directors.

The directors are elected by the members to look after their interests. A separation of both roles provides a better system of checks and balances.

During the 2024 AGM the members have elected 9 directors, 3 of which are elected for a one-year term, 3 directors elected for a two-year term and 3 directors for a three-year term. This allows us to have three new directors each year, making sure we introduce new perspectives into the board without losing the experience of sitting directors.

To make sure the National organization does not lose valuable insights the regions can offer and share amongst each other, a new committee is erected: the Regional Operations Committee. This committee is comprised of regional representatives and meets quarterly to share and discuss concerns and ideas within the individual regions.

2.2 Regional incorporation

As part of the restructuring process, our regions are also incorporating. In 2024 eight regions become incorporated.

The incorporation of the regions has several benefits. It acknowledges the region as a legal entity and as such its directors are better protected from liability and it gives more access to possible provincial grants.

The organization is still working towards providing the regions with uniform regional policies as a next step in the restructuring process.

2.3 National store

In 2024 the volume of sales was further down compared to the previous year. On average the store handles 90 orders annually, with a sales volume in 2024 of \$9,600.

We introduced two new badges into the badges program: a beginner badge focussed on safe riding apparel and a badge for the increasingly popular discipline of working equitation.

3 CANADIAN PONY CLUB MEMBERSHIP

By the end of 2024 the Canadian Pony Club had 1714 members, divided over 1476 active (youth) members and 238 horse master members.

After a significantly low membership in 2021 due to the pandemic, more active members returned to Pony Club in 2022 and 2023. However, for 2024 we see another decline in memberships, both in the active members and Horsemasters categories.

Horsemasters make up 14% of our total membership.





Overall, Canadian Pony Club sees a steady annual 3% decline in active membership numbers since 2000.







3.2 Branches

Our Branches form the grassroots within our organization. Branches are operated by individual volunteer boards and they organize a variety educational events, competition and testing for the Pony Club members that have joined these individual Branches.

In 2024 the Canadian Pony Club boasted 102 branches in 12 Regions.

3.3 Centres



There are 7 Centres active with the Canadian Pony Club. They account for 103 active members and 8 horsemasters. This makes up 6.5% of the total membership in Canadian Pony Club.

In some Regions the Centre memberships take up a larger proportion.

In MB 38% of the members are connected through a riding Centre, in WOR this percentage is 18%.

Not all Regions have Centre members, only half of the Regions have Centres, and they seem to be more prevalent in the eastern part of Canada. Our centres are located in COR, MB, NBPEI, SK and WOR.

We appreciate the support from these faciality owners and are happy they value the Canadian Pony Club as a program that will support the development of their clients in the equine field.

5 INTERNATIONAL ALLIANCE (PCIA)



Canadian Pony Club is one of the national Pony Clubs worldwide that is part of the Pony Club International Alliance. Other members include the UK, the US, Australia, New Zealand, Hongkong, South Africa and Ireland.

In 2024 the current chair of the PCIA, the US, hosted an in person international meeting in Kentucky, July 16th to July 20th. In attendance were the chairs and CEOs of the Pony Clubs in the UK, US, Canada, Australia and NZ.


